Cornwall Expedition

This years first weekend expedition took club members to Porthkerris in Cornwall, we travelled down on the Friday ready for a dive in the afternoon. We booked into the newly refurbished accommodation at Porthkerris with the expectation of launching the club boat from the beach. Our expectations were dashed when the wind changed direction and it was too rough to launch for our first dive. An alternative venue was agreed and we set off to Church Cove Gunwalloe.



The sea was very clear and it was possible to see strawberry anemones from a distance. It was a good first dive and then we returned to our accommodation to plan for the next full day.

Day 2 (Saturday) was equally windy so we headed for the other side of the peninsular to Mullion Cove.

The seas around the Lizard Peninsular were the clearest the group had witnessed. Day 3 took the group to Kaynance Cove where we snorkelled around Asparagus Island and Gull Rock. On route we saw a seal but it did not hang around; but we looked on expectantly...

Swanage Weekend

Day 3 took us to one our favourite spots, Kimmeridge Bay and we were pleased to see that the visibility was much better than the previous day. We split into groups and explored the ridges where we saw crabs, anemones and more wrasse of various sizes.

Member Training Update

All club members are expected to work towards a BSAC Snorkelling Qualification, your instructor has a record of your level and you should ensure that you are signed up in your Qualification Record Book (QRB). This term your instructor will encourage all members to have the appropriate QRB and reflect your achievements in it.

As a reminder, QRB and reference materials are to be purchased from the club. QRBs are available for £2.50 and course books for £5.00. Please ask Gail for details.

BSAC Membership

As well as paying a subscription to the club that covers pool fees, etc. members should ensure that they apply/renew their BSAC membership. The British Sub-Aqua Club (BSAC) is managed by volunteers and BSAC membership subscription pays towards the management costs of running this international organisation. BSAC membership also provides third party insurance cover that is essential for pool and open water sessions.

Our membership secretary Guy Dubois will be following up BSAC Membership issues.

Membership Fee Increases

At the Club AGM in February the committee agreed to increase membership fees to ensure the club covered its costs. The 2% increase means that membership fees are now:

Juniors £47 per term Adults £50 per term

The concessionary discounts for those working towards an award outside the BSAC Syllabus, i.e. DoE or internal courses such as the coaching course will continue.

Also, members are reminded that fees are due every

term (three terms per year) and are to be paid within the first two weeks of term; after this time a late payment fee of £5 is added to the membership fee. If any member has difficulty meeting this timescale, i.e. due to holiday, illness, etc., please let us know.

Club finances have been a concern for some time and we are always looking for ways of operating more efficiently or increasing our income through grants or sponsorship.
